<u>ACS (Clinical)</u> - Provides a comprehensive view of the clinical roles, functions and skills necessary to operate an Alternate Care Site.			X		
<u>ACS (Supportive)</u> - Provides a comprehensive view of the setup/tear down and supportive staffing roles and functions within an Alternate Care Site.				X	
<u>CBRNE</u> - Provides volunteers with the knowledge, preparation skills and training first responders need to safely deal with the consequences of a wide range of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or explosive weapons, ranging from very simple to exceedingly complex.		X			
<u>DHV Alert & Notification</u> - Provides volunteers with an overview of the State of California Disaster Healthcare Volunteers (DHV) website. Volunteers will gain the basic skills needed to maintain an accurate profile, complete with skills and notification preferences to ensure an effective mobilization during an activation. NOTE: This course requirement may be met by completing your DHV Profile.	X	X	X	X	
<u>Grief & Loss</u> - Provides mental health professional volunteers with the skills to recognize the normal aspects of the grieving or mourning process, coping with the pain associated with loss, feeling supported through the anxiety surrounding life changes that may follow a loss, and strategies for seeking support and self-care. <u>Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA)</u> - This course explains the uses and disclosures of identifiable health information that are allowed or permitted by the HIPAA Privacy Regulations. Identifiable health information may relate to any patient, whether they are alive or deceased, and it may be in any form, no matter how it is communicated or stored. No matter if you have access to identifiable health information for treatment, billing, healthcare operations (TPO) or any activity that falls outside TPO, you will need to be aware of patient privacy requirements. This course also identifies new rights for individuals and the processes that health care providers must implement to support individual rights.	X	X	X	X	
<u>ICS 100</u> - Provides the foundation for higher level ICS training. Volunteers will understand the history, features, principles, and organizational structure of the ICS. Thereby understanding the relationship between ICS and the National Incident Management System (NIMS).	X	X	X	X	

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<u>ICS 200</u> - ICS 200 is designed to enable personnel to operate efficiently during an incident or event within the Incident Command System (ICS). ICS-200 provides training on and resources for personnel who are likely to assume a supervisory position within the ICS.					X
<u>ICS 300/400</u> - This is an intermediate/advanced ICS course for supervisory or management staff that would be assigned in a supervisory or leadership role in the command or general staff of an emergency response incident or major pre-planned event.					X
<u>ICS 700</u> - Provides an overview of the National Incident Management System, a consistent nationwide template that enables all government, private-sector, and nongovernmental organizations to work together during domestic incidents.	X	X	X	X	
<u>ICS 800B</u> – This course introduces participants to the concepts and principals of the National Response Framework (NRF). Course objectives include: purpose; response doctrine; roles and responsibilities of entities; actions that support national response; response organizations used for multi-agency coordination; and how planning relates to national preparedness. TARGET AUDIENCE: Mid-level management, Command and General Staff, Emergency Operations Center staff.					X
<u>Mass Care and Shelter (General Population)</u> - Provides an overview of a general population shelter, staffing, and its function during an emergency/disaster.	X		X	X	
<u>Mass Care and Shelter (Medical Shelter)</u> - Provides a clinical overview of the medical needs of medically fragile persons in a mass care setting.			X		
<u>Mass Casualty Incidents (MCI)</u> - This training program will increase first responder readiness to respond, triage, treat and transport patients arising from a multiple patient or mass casualty incident.		X			
<u>OES 101</u> - Provides an overview of the county's Emergency Operations Plan, Emergency Operations Center and the role of the MRC within that plan. This includes the steps taken to activate the MRC.	X	X	X	X

<u>POD (Supportive Staff)</u> - Provides a comprehensive view of the logistics and mobilization/demobilization of a Point of Dispensing site. Includes an overview of supportive staffing roles, functions and skills necessary for a Point of Dispensing Site.				X	

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<u>Psychological First Aid (A)</u> - Provides Mental Health Professionals comprehensive instruction in the preparation, knowledge, and skills needed to deliver Psychological First Aid (PFA) in emergency settings (i.e. POD, ACS, Shelter, etc.)	X				
<u>Psychological First Aid (B)</u> - This course enables individual non-mental health professional volunteers to recognize the signs of stress in clients, co-workers and themselves during a disaster and apply immediate support to people who may be experiencing stress. Participants will also learn how to obtain additional mental health support for themselves, co-workers and clients.		X	X	X	
<u>Psychological Triage</u> - Participants will understand the process of evaluating and sorting victims of psychological trauma and directing them to immediate or delayed treatment. These skills will help mental health professional volunteers to better triage large numbers of patients during emergencies and to do the greatest good for the greatest number of victims.	X				
<u>Simple Triage and Rapid Treatment (START) Triage</u> - START triage system training provides volunteers with the skills necessary to conduct a rapid assessment (taking less than a minute) of patients, determining which of four priority categories patients should be in, and visibly identifying the categories for rescuers who will treat the patients. <u>Strategic National Stockpile (SNS)</u> - Provides volunteers with an overview of the Strategic National Stockpile (SNS). Includes an overview of policy & procedures of the SNS and the logistics of its receipt, staging, storage and distribution to Points of Dispensing (POD) sites.				X
